Sharing the Bible in Egypt at a Time of Need

As the COVID-19 pandemic and Russia's invasion of Ukraine take their toll on the global economy, countless Egyptians are under severe pressure. The rising cost of essential items has increased the financial burden on already vulnerable communities. The Church in Egypt is facing a daunting challenge of meeting the basic needs of its members and those in financial crisis. Confronted with such desperation, the Bible Society of Egypt has stepped up to support the Church's efforts. Their mission is clear

- to make Scripture resources accessible and affordable for those who are struggling to make ends meet and in need of hope. Achieving this aim is not straightforward. According to research, people in Egypt tend to only read in short bursts and would be unlikely to read from a full Bible. The Bible Society has responded to this trend by focusing its efforts on providing Scripture tracts and editions of the New Testament to recipients, encouraging easier engagement with the text.

Another obstacle to making the Bible easily available to Egyptians is the cost of Bibles in relation to people's income. Shockingly, over 32.5% of Egyptians live below the poverty line, with some earning less than £1.19 per day. To ensure that even the poorest in society can access the Scriptures, the Bible Society took the decision to subsidise the wholesale price of Bibles. This allows churches to purchase in bulk and offer the Bibles and Scripture portions at a price that is within reach of every Egyptian. However, in order to maintain this project, the Bible Society relies heavily on donations since the selling price is far below the real cost.

Since the start of this project, over 245,000 Bible and Scripture portions have been distributed throughout Egypt. In that time, there have been many inspiring stories of people like Samira and Marwa (not their real names) using their meagre resources to share the Good News with those around them. Samira, for instance, comes to the Bible Society of Egypt's bookshop to buy Bibles, New Testaments, and booklets. She uses these materials to share the Good News with people she encounters, praying and asking the Lord to guide her to someone who needs the Scriptures. 'I have found that so many people are curious and desire to read the Bible so often someone will ask me where they can get one. I tell them I have extra and leave it with them if they want it.'

Meanwhile, Marwa, a hospital cleaner, has opened an account at the Bible Society bookshop to deposit any extra money she has until she can make her next purchase. Her commitment is unwavering, and she has even gathered her friends to contribute to the cause, buying Bibles to distribute in the hospital. 'I don't want to be tempted to spend this money on other urgent things,' she explains. 'I'm saving it for when I can distribute God's Word again.'

Thanks to the Bible Society's efforts, individuals like Samira and Marwa have been enabled to share the Bible with those who cross their path. Thousands of churches and ministries have also benefited from their subsidised Bible resources. In a time when the Church of Egypt needs support, the Bible Society's project is providing hope and light to those in financial crisis and other difficult circumstances. The impact of their work is immeasurable, and their dedication to share the Good News is truly inspiring.

Thanks to those who support the work of the Bible Society, especially those who donate directly to Bible House, the head office in Edinburgh.

CYCLONE FREDDY

Cyclone Freddy, the longest-lasting tropical cyclone on record (lasting 34 days), has hit Malawi and Mozambique. This cyclone is the equivalent of a full North Atlantic hurricane season. Malawi experienced a year's worth of rain during the 4-week cyclone. The number of people affected by the cyclone continues to rise. Over 508,000 people are displaced and hundreds have lost their lives. There's also an increased risk of malaria and cholera in the immediate aftermath. In the face of this new tragedy, your support is more vital than ever.

Christian Aid Week is at its most powerful when a disaster happens. The fundraising supported by churches, communities and individuals each May allows us to provide relief and support when disasters hit.

Our response: Our partners and team in Malawi have been

responding to the immediate recovery needs of communities. This includes:

SOUND DESK

The sound desk operation is a vital part of our Church service. The operation is split into two sections; The sound control unit monitors the microphones and transfers

The second section is the operation of the camera, the transfer of images to the screens from the camera and laptop and the recording of the service and uploading to YouTube.

At present we have six members of the sound desk team and when we are recording a service we require two members of the team on duty.

One member of our team is retiring in July and we require more volunteers to join the team for the operation of the sound control unit. This is a non technical role and a minimum of training is required to carry out this function.

If you are interested please let me know and we can arrange a visit, without commitment, to explain how the system works. At present we only have three members of the team who are trained to operate the camera, transfer images from the camera and laptop to the screens and to record and upload the service to YouTube. One member of this team will be stepping down from this role in July and this means when we resume our services after the summer break we will only have two persons available for this role. This will mean that the Church service will not be recorded each week and it is anticipated that

we will reduce our recordings to only one or two services per month.

If anyone is interested in this more technical role then please let me know and arrangements can be made for a demonstration session, without commitment, to explain the operation.

GLASGOW PRESBYTERY REPORT

Meetings were held on 25 and 26 April 2023 to discuss and agree the revised Mission Plan for Glasgow Presbytery. This draft was accepted and sent to the Faith Nurture Forum and the General Trustees on 28 April. Receipt has been acknowledged by the FNF and it is anticipated that formal notification and the hoped for acceptance will be received in June 2023.

The original Draft Mission Plan of Glasgow Presbytery had been sent to Edinburgh in October 2022 but it was not approved by the national Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Group (PMPIG). PMPIG had sought greater clarity regarding the cluster plans as it felt that there were too many churches with a category "A"; classification; indeed they highlighted the churches in

Kirkintilloch, Lenzie and Kilsyth. Some clusters had had difficulty in completing their cluster plans despite their valiant efforts and so were incomplete. None of the suggested amendments took into account the work undertaken within church communities. Cluster groups had to revisit their submissions. The Glasgow Presbytery Mission Plan Creation Group (PMPCG) met weekly and discussed and assisted certain clusters; thereafter a revised Mission Plan was developed.

Congregations were "cited" to attend one of the two meetings; this permitted one member from each church to give a brief talk about the effect of the revisions on their missionary plan. The revised plan shows the reclassification of the 4 churches in Kirkintilloch and Lenzie as a "B", and a review date of December 2023 with disposal of surplus buildings by December 2027. Little discussion with PMPCG, if any, took place with our cluster group. Category "B" means that dates must be included and this was done by PMPCG. The two Kirk Sessions of Lenzie Union and Lenzie Old had previously met and taken the decision to explore a "union" by December 2025 but no decision was taken as to the disposal (if any) of buildings. This decision was not stated in the revised plan. The Session Clerk of Kirkintilloch St Mary's spoke on behalf of the 4 churches expressing concern at the change in status but no change was made by Presbytery. This was seemingly to facilitate discussions about the reduction in the number of buildings, given that Glasgow had been allocated only 84 ministerial posts, plus 12 for the Priority Area churches.

Some of the changes to cluster groups submissions (without consultation) include "decision dates" and "disposal dates". Several churches had indeed decided to unite and dispose of certain buildings, however the dates given by PMPCG in the revised plan were not realistic. Kelvinbridge Church had taken the

decision to unite with Wellington (currently in a transitional ministry) and close the Kelvinbridge building, but the given disposal date of September 2023 was unrealistic. It was clarified that as Kelvinbridge had chosen to dispose of their building then the date was flexible.

The Presbytery Mission Plan Act (Act VIII 2021) was clear in the use of "words/phrases" and so the word "union" has been used several times in the revised Plan whereas in some cases churches had used the term "partnership agreement". This was not one of the phrases contained within the Act and so could not be used. This naturally has led to confusion and uncertainty.

A motion by a member of Chryston Parish Church, which is in a cluster group consisting of Sandyhills and Robroyston churches, was accepted by Presbyters. The new submission by PMPCG had reduced the allocation of 3 unrestricted ministers to 1 minister and a 0.5 MDS (Ministries Development Staff). The 3 churches, wish to explore the development of a new form of adjustment, to include a church partnership agreement and associated plan between the 3 churches, to be worked through with Presbytery and the Faith Nurture Forum. This plan is to include investment in additional locally funded staff, to support the work of our ministry teams.

A motion from a minister with an amendment was accepted, to the effect that the submission to Edinburgh should record how presbyters felt about the whole process, as a great deal of stress and uncertainty has resulted from the whole Mission Plan process, which has been carried out in too short a time frame.

From the Manse

May 2023

Dear Friends,



Presently I am preparing to stay in chaplain's accommodation in Edinburgh for this year's General Assembly. The Moderator designate Rev Sally Foster-Fulton invited me earlier this year to be one of her chaplains. Way back in 2001 I did an enquiry placement with Sally whilst she was minister of Camelon: Irving. An enquiry placement was a bit like work experience where you shadowed a minister on a very part-time basis for six months to see what ministry involved and to discern if this was what God was calling you to do. One of my worries was how would I manage as a young woman with two small children. Sally happened to be around my age and also had two young children and she showed me through her warmth and sense of humour that ministry as a young mum was absolutely possible and also enriching to a congregation. Needless to say her example inspired me to apply and over twenty years later I can honestly say that her words were true.

I want to thank you all for welcoming David and our family over these past seven years so warmly. Our daughters were married at Lenzie Old and our grandchildren Sienna and Reuben baptized therefore Lenzie Old will always hold a special place in their hearts. We have journeyed with you through happy and sad times, in particular through a pandemic which lasted so much longer than any of us could have ever anticipated. We have seen new groups established including 'Come and Sing' and have had many fun social events and pilgrimages to Spring Harvest and the Holy Land.

When I first arrived in 2016 we worked hard over the first few years to compile a document which we presented to the Strategic Plan Committee which included the five marks of mission and how we were fulfilling them. We were delighted when presbytery decided to sist the plan for Lenzie and that our church would be allowed to stay open. Shortly afterwards everything changed

when the new Radical Mission Plan meant that all churches had to readjust due to an almost 50% cut in ministry. Despite all of this it is good that you are now in a position where you are able to enter into discussions with Lenzie Union on an equal footing due to the previous plan being sisted.

My five-year tenure means that I am required to move on to allow this reduction in ministry to take place. I have been most fortunate to have had seven happy and fulfilling years with you and for this I am wholly grateful. I thank you all for making these seven years such a blessing. You are a warm, welcoming congregation yet also very humble. You have so many gifts and strengths and I hope that I have played a small role in encouraging you over these past seven years to practice your own special and unique ministries and to know God's blessing upon all that you do in his name. You also have a very deep faith in our Lord Jesus and so many of you have ministered to me over the years. I know that both my own faith and David's is deeper because of your commitment and example.

I also want to thank you for releasing me with your love and blessing. Leaving has been so difficult for me yet at the same time I know that God is calling me to write and serve the church in other ways. I thank the Session Clerks, Elders and members of the Board for the wonderful social evening at Lenzie Golf Club. The buffet was delicious and the company even better! Thanks to Ian Hector for his very kind words and also for the gifts you gave to me. Thank you to Come and Sing for their lovely card and gifts and also the Thursday Club. Thank you for the beautiful stole, generous amount of money, and flowers you presented to me on my final Sunday. Thanks also to Focus and the Sunday School for their lovely card, balloon and personalised story book which I absolutely love! Thanks also to the choir for their lovely pieces and to David Calder for his beautiful and very moving farewell medley.

Finally I want to thank you for allowing me to have some assistance over these past 18 months with the help of Revs Graham and Sheila Blount. This allowed me to attain the Masters level in my ministry research to those living with dementia and I am delighted that Sheila and Graham have agreed to continue

to provide pastoral support and pulpit supply. I know many of you have been blessed with Sheila's pastoral care and Graham's input in Conversations our Bible Study group.

I end this letter with sadness but also deep joy and gratitude for knowing you and having had the privilege of being your minister over the past seven years. I know that God is with you and will guide you into the future as he has faithfully done in the past. Rich blessings await you and many more people will come to know God's love in the years to come because of your commitment, faith and witness.
